



Emirati greetings are a vital part of daily life, reflecting the warmth, respect, and hospitality of the culture. They can vary slightly depending on the gender of the person you're addressing, with subtle differences in phrases and tone. In this lesson, you will explore these variations and learn how to use common Emirati greetings confidently and appropriately, making your interactions more meaningful and respectful.
